Personal, Social and Emotional Development	Children in the Nursery will take ownership of taking off and putting on their coats. They will also be encouraged to zip and button their coats. Children will listen to a range of stories which will help them understand their feeling. Children will also learn about the similarities and differences between themselves and others from around the world, through stories.			At home, practice dressing and undressing. It is very important that the children leave Nursery being able to manage their own self-care.		
Physical Development	Children will work on developing their gross and fine motor skills throughout the half term. They will practice their jumping and ball skills including catching and throwing a ball. Children will engage in activities such as dough disco and squiggle whilst you wriggle to improve their fine motor skills.			At home, practice kicking a football into a target e.g. a goal. Encourage children to run and jump whilst outside to improve their gross motor skills. To improve fine motor skills encourage your children to use a pincer grip. An activity you could try at home is putting pegs on paper or on a washing line!
